

CALENDAR OF MEETINGS & SPECIAL EVENTS PUBLIC AND GUESTS WELCOME

JANUARY

Thursday, 7:00pm - GRAAA Meets at Grand Rapids Public Museum "The Sky Overhead in 2024, from Northern Lights to the Great Eclipse."

Join Chaffee Planetarium staff for a three-part presentation. First, highlights of the winter sky, including the locations of telescopic objects of interest; then a simulation of the aurora and an explanation of why 2024 may be an unusually active year for this elusive phenomenon; finally, a realtime and authentic representation of April's total solar eclipse. See the bright planets and stars that will appear and experience the ambiance you should be looking for if you plan to view the real thing in April. Free parking in Museum parking ramp is available for GRAAA members with ticket validation. Pre-registration is encouraged.

FEBRUARY

- Thursday, 7:00pm GRAAA Meets at Grand Rapids Public Museum These Are My Favorite Things, an informal discussion and demonstration facilitated by longtime GRAAA observing experts Greg Comegys and Mike Murphy. Greg and Mike have decades of experience observing with a variety of optical systems and attachments, and lots of tips for how you too can get the most out of your observing from both backyard and observatory. Attendees with their own special gadgets or recommendations are encouraged to participate in a discussion or even to demonstrate their "favorite things."
- Saturday, 11:00am SPECIAL EVENT at Grand Rapids Public Museum Human Factors in Spaceflight, featuring Dr. Robert Satcher, retired NASA astronaut and prominent surgeon and chemical engineer. Initially considered a niche field for astronauts, space medicine is evolving as an academic discipline, and is crucial for establishing human presence on the Moon, Mars, and beyond. Despite challenges, the prospect of one day performing surgery in space is considered feasible with existing technology. The growing space economy further supports the promising future of space medicine tied to ongoing technological innovation. This event is part of "Roger That!," the annual celebration of Roger B. Chaffee, sponsored by GVSU. Pre-registration at grpm.org/rogerthat is recommended to ensure admission.

MARCH

Thursday, 7:00pm - GRAAA Meets at Grand Rapids Public Museum Women's Voices in Astronomical Discovery, presented by longtime GRAAA member Mark McIntosh. Now retired, Mark worked as a photojournalist for both WOOD and WZZM TV, and prior to that was a production specialist at Abrams Planetarium at MSU. Following an overview of women's contributions to astronomy long ago, he will turn to those of more recent history, concentrating on the work of Caroline Herschel, Maria Mitchell, and others. They made significant contributions, despite some being looked upon only as human "computers" by their male contemporaries. This is a fitting program for Women's History Month.

APRIL

- 12 Friday, 8:30pm-11:30pm SPECIAL EVENT at Veen Observatory Statewide Astronomy Night (SWAN) Public Observing Event. Join staff of the Chaffee Planetarium and members of GRAAA for a night of free stargazing, observatory tours, and more. Space activities will be facilitated by educators from GVSU and the Museum, and snacks will be provided on a first-come, first-served basis. Activities and tours will be available rain or shine; telescope viewing will only be possible if skies are clear. Educational facilities throughout Michigan are participating in this annual effort to promote astronomy, sponsored by Michigan State University.
- Thursday, 7:00pm GRAAA Annual Report to Members GRAAA Today and Tomorrow—A Report to the Membership, via Zoom. GRAAA officers and key committee members will summarize their recent activities and future plans. Members are urged to join virtually for this annual opportunity to not only hear about upcoming plans and challenges, but also to offer comments and suggestions that will improve your Association.
- Thursday, 7:00pm GRAAA Meets at Grand Rapids Public Museum Reports from Under the Shadow, presented by various GRAAA members who successfully witnessed the April 8th solar eclipse. There should be an impressive array of images as well as adventure stories from all over the country. Don't miss what could be an enlightening montage. Look for an email in mid-April with a request to send your images to have your stories included in this presentation. - Thursday, 7:00pm GRAAA Meets at Grand Rapids Public Museum Michigan Dark Skies, A Resource Essential to Life as We Know It, presented by Dr. Sally Oey, Professor of Astronomy at the University of Michigan. Dr. Oey notes that a natural, star-studded sky is only accessible to a fraction of the world's people, and that ignorance is causing accelerating degradation of this precious resource. As a strong proponent for preserving dark skies for both astronomers and public, Dr. Oey will explain how light pollution can be a serious threat to the environment, health, and safety, and how to combat the problem.

- Thursday, 7:00pm GRAAA Meets at Aquinas College

 To the Moon—What We Know and Why Go Back, presented by Solar System specialist Dr. Nicolle Zellner of Albion College. Dr. Zellner is the 2021 winner of the Carl Sagan Medal for Excellence in Public Communication in Planetary Science and the ideal presenter for observance of the 30th anniversary of Ralph Baldwin Observatory at Aquinas, named after the Grand Rapids astronomer/ businessman who wrote groundbreaking books about the nature of the Moon. Seventy years later, and fifty years after the last Apollo mission, Dr. Zellner will review that history and how a closer look at the Moon's impact history poses new questions. There is a new insight into lunar and planet formation, and impetus for humans to return.

- Thursday, 7:00pm GRAAA Meets at Grand Rapids Public Museum Why We Throw DARTs, presented by Dr. Seth Jacobson, a planetary specialist from Michigan State University who participated in NASA's successful Double Asteroid Redirection Test (DART) in 2022. Dr. Jacobson will demonstrate that asteroids are not merely piles of rubble, but are reshaped by radiation and even split apart to form new ones. He will also show how alteration of the orbit of one member of an asteroid pair could one day provide insight into how to avert Earth's collision with a threatening body. Science fiction from the film Don't Look Up becomes reality in this year's James Marron Memorial Event.

Join Dave as he uses planetarium technology to turn the clock back to Biblical times to search the sky of that era for phenomena that might have played a part in the story of the Magi, which has intrigued scholars for centuries.
